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Synopsis

Uncle Jedidiah is Sarah Jean's favorite relative. He visits once a week to cut her daddy's and granddaddy's hair. He also pretends to cut Sarah's hair, putting good smelling lotion on the back of her neck. Uncle Jed has a dream that he shares with Sarah— Uncle Jed wants to open his own barbershop. Living in the South in the 1920s, this dream is regarded as impossible by his friends and relatives. Poor sharecroppers don't open their own businesses. Despite setbacks—little Sarah's sickness, from which only an expensive operation can save her, and the banks failing in the Great Depression just when he'd saved enough money—Uncle Jed never gives up. 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Dig Deeper

1. What does it mean to be joyful or cheerful?

2. Does Uncle Jed show this character trait? How can you tell?

 Read the following verse. What does it teach us? Romans 12:12: "Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer."

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9. Uncle Jed immediately provides the money needed from his savings. He says the money doesn't matter. He can't let anything happen to his Sarah.

10. Hebrews 13:5 says we should not love money, we should be content with what we have. God reminds us that He is always with us and we can't lose Him. Uncle Jed seems to be happy with what he has and does not love his money. He shows this when he helps pay for Sarah's operation (and again when he remains cheerful even after losing all his money in the bank).

11. The banks failed and Uncle Jed lost all that he had saved. \$3,000 in 1930 would be approximately \$44,820 in 2020. Answers will vary if calculated for current years.

15. They come from all over the county to celebrate with Uncle Jed and to have their hair done in his new shop.
